ATTENDANCE

SCHOOL DINNER SYSTEM

A reminder that if you wish to order a school dinner for your child, you will need to order their it at home. If you do not have access to the internet, we can order with you at the start of each half term.

Don't worry if your child cannot remember what you've ordered for them! At lunchtime, when your child arrives at dining room counter they will select their name on the touch screen, which is then displayed to the cook; this will also flag up any dietary needs.

For those children who are in receipt of free school meals, the allowance will be added to their account and they can order in exactly the same way.



UNIFORM



Hair

Long hair needs to be tied back and there should be no extreme haircuts. Hair bands and scrunchies should be simple and in the school colours.

READING – PARENT PARTNERSHIP

- I. Build reading into your child's daily routine: read every day.
- 2. Be a great reading partner with your child!
- 3. Bring books everywhere.
- 4. Be enthusiastic!

GUIDANCE FOR READING RECORDS

We want children to enjoy reading but they do need to read a range of genres if they are to get to age related expectations at the end of the year and they must read regularly.

We are happy for children to record their own reading but would like a parent to show that they have heard their child read at least once a week.

Adults in school will always write in green pen so please do not use green at home. Please record the date, the name of the book and which pages were read.



FURTHER GUIDANCE FOR READING RECORDS

When children record that they have read, they should write 1-2 sentences that give us some evidence of their reading; something along the following lines:

- p17-35: I am really enjoying this book so far and love the character Holly, because she is brave and sparky. She doesn't get on well with her brother Theo though!
- p23-29: On these pages I discovered that a pig cannot look up at the sky and a crocodile cannot stick out its tongue.
- p163-170: This chapter finished on a real cliff hanger. I can't wait to find out what was in the box and why it is so important.
